HYMN LBW#132 "COME, YOU FAITHFUL, RAISE THE STRAIN"

- 1 Come, you faithful, raise the strain of triumphant gladness! God has brought his Israel into joy from sadness, loosed from Pharaoh's bitter yoke Jacob's sons and daughters, led them with unmoistened foot through the Red Sea waters.

THE DAY IN THE CHURCH YEAR: SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER

In today's gospel the risen Christ appears to the disciples and offers them the gift of peace. Even amid doubts and questions that fill our everyday lives, we experience the resurrection as we hear God's Word, especially in the midst of sickness, suffering, and death. As the early Christians proclaimed the resurrection, we rejoice today in the new birth and living hope we receive in baptism.

FIRST LESSON: 1 PETER 1:3-9

This epistle was written to encourage Christians experiencing hardships and suffering because of their faith in Christ. The letter opens by blessing God for the living hope we have through Christ's resurrection even amid difficult circumstances and surroundings.

³Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, ⁴and into an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you, ⁵who are being protected by the power of God through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time. ⁶In this you rejoice, even if now for a little while you have had to suffer various trials, ⁷so that the genuineness of your faith—being more precious than gold that, though perishable, is tested by fire—may be found to result in praise and glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed. ⁸Although you have not seen him, you love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and rejoice with an indescribable and glorious joy, ⁹for you are receiving the outcome of your faith, the salvation of your souls.

EASTER VERSE & ALLELUIA

Alleluia. Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe. Alleluia. (John 20:29)

The Holy Gospel according to St. John, the 20th Chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord.**

THE HOLY GOSPEL: JOHN 20:19-31

The risen Jesus appears to his disciples, offering them a benediction, a commission, and the gift of the Holy Spirit. But one of their number is missing, and his unbelief prompts another visit from the Lord.

¹⁹When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁰After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. ²¹Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." ²²When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

²⁴But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. ²⁵So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

²⁶A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁷Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." ²⁸Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" ²⁹Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

³⁰Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. ³¹But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

O God, open our hearts to the cries of those in pain. We pray for those isolated physically or emotionally during these most difficult days. We especially pray for those suffering through addiction, mental illness, chronic pain, grief, and for those we so often seek to ignore, but for whom our Lord called us to minister: those in prison, the lonely, the poor, the outcast, the least and the lost...and for all in need whom we name before you (pause). Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

O God, open us to your ways of love. Make us into your peacemakers. Bless the work of all healthcare professionals, emergency responders, scientists, and relief workers, especially those who find themselves in harm's way as they labor to alleviate suffering and find a cure for this plague that has afflicted all. Lord, in your mercy,

hear our prayer.

O God, open the way to eternal life as we remember those who have died in faith. Free us from the fear of death, that we may embrace the peace you have promised and bear witness to resurrection life given in your name. Lord, in your mercy,

hear our prayer.

With bold confidence in your love, almighty God, we place all for whom we pray into your eternal care; through Christ Jesus, our Savior and Lord. **Amen.**

THIS WEEK ON THE CHURCH CALENDAR, WE REMEMBER...

SUNDAY, APRIL 19, 2020: OLAVUS PETRI, priest, died 1552; LAURENTIUS PETRI, Bishop of Uppsala, died 1573; RENEWERS OF THE CHURCH.

These two brothers studied with Luther at the University of Wittenberg and then returned to their native Sweden to introduce the Lutheran reforms. Olavus published a catechism and hymnal; Laurentius was a professor who defended the office of bishop and later became one.

TUESDAY, APRIL 21, 2020: ANSELM, Bishop of Canterbury, died 1109

This eleventh-century monk was one of the greatest theologians of the Middle Ages. He is remembered for emphasizing the maternal aspects of God, and for the theory that the Son of God became human in order to make the necessary payment for our sin.

THURSDAY, APRIL 23, 2020: TOYOHIKO KAGAWA, renewer of society, died 1960

Born in Kobe, Japan, Kagawa was orphaned as a young child. Later, when he became Christian, he was disowned by the rest of his family. Wishing to bring Christian principles into society, he worked among poor people, established schools and hospitals, and worked for peace.

SATURDAY, APRIL 25, 2020: ST. MARK, EVANGELIST

He was not numbered among the twelve apostles, yet Mark was probably a member of the early church community. The gospel that bears his name is the shortest and most direct, and many scholars think it was the first to be written.
