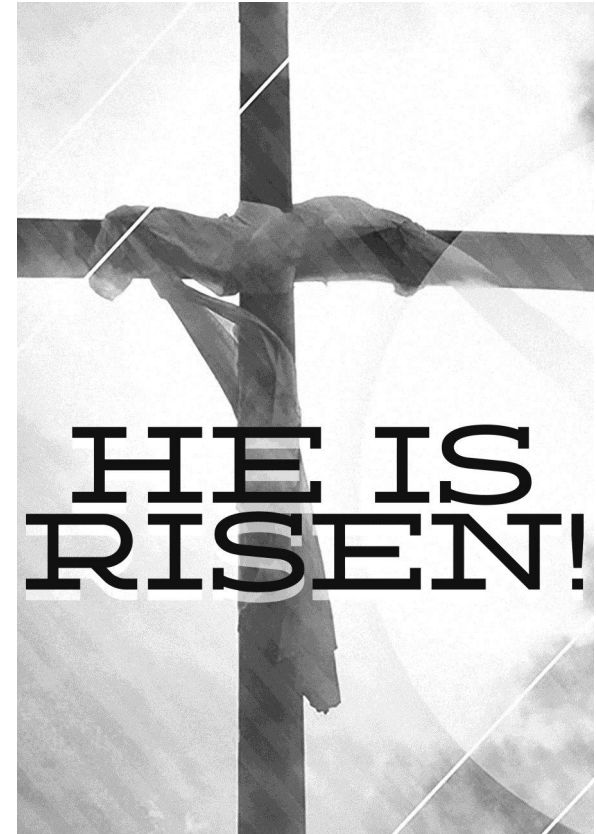

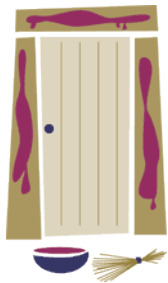

**DOORPOSTS** — The image of a blood-marked doorframe is from the Passover account in Exodus. God directed the Israelites to slaughter lambs for a final meal and paint their doorposts with the blood. God sent the Angel of Death to kill the firstborn sons of Egypt, but the blood signaled that the Destroyer should “pass over” those homes. Likewise, the blood of Jesus, the Lamb of God, saves us from eternal death.

## Parallels & Prophecies

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Quite a few years ago, I attended the musical performance "Behold the Lamb" at the Sight and Sound Millennium Theatre. The last scene was especially powerful with stark contrasts. The spacious stage was divided, depicting two different yet parallel scenarios. On the left, Jesus had just been born and his mother Mary was lovingly wrapping him in swaddling cloths. She placed him in a manger which was a feeding trough thought to be in a cave or grotto. On the right, Jesus had just been crucified and Joseph of Arimethea was lovingly wrapping his body in a burial shroud before placing him in a cave. Just as the swaddling cloth protected the infant Jesus from harm, the burial cloth also protected and preserved the body. Often the cloth was white, symbolizing purity and holiness.

According to Luke 2:12, at the time of Jesus birth, an angel spoke to the shepherds referring to swaddling cloths as a sign to find the Messiah. Since Luke made it a point to mention the swaddling cloths, it is theorized that they were a prophetic reference to Jesus' burial cloths. After a period of time, Magi brought gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh to Jesus to express their devotion, love and respect. While gold is fit for a king, frankincense and myrrh are fragrant resins used at the time of burial which are also a foreshadowing of Jesus' death. After Jesus' crucifixion, when the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Salome, who were myrrh bearers, also brought spices to anoint Jesus' body to express their devotion, love and respect.

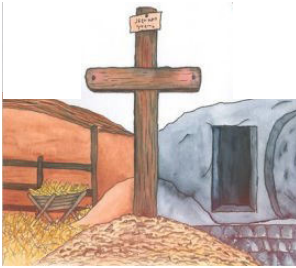

When the women arrived at the tomb, they found the stone rolled away and the inside was empty. When Peter and another disciple arrived, they saw strips of linen lying by themselves. Jesus was no longer bound by earthly ties and was in the process of transitioning into a heavenly being. The burial cloth was folded separately from the linen strips and it has been described as a cocoon from which the resurrected Christ emerged.

The rolled away stone and empty tomb serve as evidence of the Resurrection. Jesus didn't need an angel to roll away the stone in order to come out of the tomb, the stone needed to be rolled away so that we can enter, see and believe. Because Jesus died for our sins, we no longer have the burden of sin weighing us down like a heavy stone. One day our tombs will be empty as we will be raised up to eternal life. Then our strife will be over and our battle will be won. Hallelujah, Jesus lives and so will we!


**The God who hides**

Isaiah declares, “Truly, you are a God who hides himself, O God of Israel, the Savior” (45:15, ESV). But why would God hide? Isn’t our knowing God the point? Martin Luther explained that God hides in unexpected places so as not to be found where the world assumes a god would be — in power, status, fame, wealth — but to be found in weakness, humility and places of suffering.

“Those who have found God in the cross of Jesus Christ,” said 20<sup>th</sup>-century theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer, “know how wonderfully God hides himself in this world and how he is closest precisely when we believe him to be most distant.” So God assures us of his presence in the humble manger, among the poor and outcast during his ministry, in the excruciating suffering of the cross, and with us in every struggle.

God hides not to avoid us but so we will discover him precisely where we need him most, and where others need us most.

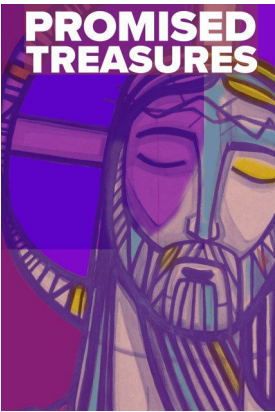

## PROMISED TREASURES

MATTHEW 13:52

This Lenten season, we have a fresh opportunity to embrace God’s amazing love for us, His baptized children, in new ways. St. Paul clearly says that “faith comes from hearing” (Romans 10:17), but the Gospel is also communicated through the physical senses of sight, smell, touch, and taste. Jesus mentions that a good teacher not only brings out new treasures but reminds people of old and rich treasures as well (see Matthew 13:52). This series began with ashes, then proceeded to salt, water, light, bread, and finally, palms. During Holy Week, the focus shifts toward water and blood, wood, fragrant oil, and finally, on Easter, milk and honey. All these beautiful Old and New Testament elements will remind you of God’s eternal love in Christ, fill you with renewed hope, and increase your joy, knowing that because we are His baptized children, God is near to us now more than ever.

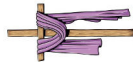
### Jesus answers our uncertainties

Thomas didn’t believe the other disciples when they said Jesus had risen. The two travelers to Emmaus despaired over Jesus’ death, uncertain what might come next.

During our life of faith, we all face questions, doubts and despair. In *Fearless*, Max Lucado says Jesus’ responses to us echo his responses to the disciples. His answer to our doubt is the same as with Thomas: “Touch my body” — which we do every time we connect with the church (the body of Christ), wounds and all. As with the Emmaus disciples, Jesus urges us to ponder his story found in Scripture — which we do through Bible reading and study. Today, just as long ago, Jesus meets his followers — in his body, in his Word — and strengthens our faith.
