

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Within days of the deadly shooting of twelve members of the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh, I received an email from the Muslim Association of the Lehigh Valley (I was on their mailing list because confirmands and adults from the St. Andrew's congregation had participated in several interfaith events there). The email expressed condolences and prayers for those who had lost loved ones in the shooting. I was struck by this outpouring of care since Muslims and Jews have been historic enemies.

Sometimes we are afraid that associating with people of a different faith might harm our own Christian faith. I remember a parent of one of our confirmands refused to allow his son to attend a program at the MALV because of fear that Muslims would try to convert him from Christianity. Sadly, this young man missed out on rich hospitality, new learning...and great snacks! Rather than attempting to draw us away from Christianity, the Muslim leaders helped us see what we share in common, in addition to some of the differences (like women not allowed to be in a leadership role in worship).



At our Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod's Learning Ministry Day on January 26, nearby at Jerusalem, Schuylkill Haven, the keynote speaker will be Elsayed "Steve" Elmarzouky, spokesperson for the Reading Muslim Community. Steve is past president of the Islamic Center of Reading, and chaplain in the correctional and healthcare systems in Berks County. He speaks about his personal journey of faith as a practicing Muslim in Egypt and the U.S. and how his understanding of Islam reflects principles familiar to all people of faith. Teachers from Lutheran congregations around our Synod will be enriched in their teaching after hearing from Steve. How neat!

I am looking forward to attending this Learning Ministry Day with several of our Sunday School teachers. But as the publicity says, "There is something for everyone (not just Christian education people)". So, my hope is that others of you will join us. More information can be found on the Synod's website: nepasynod.org. Please call the Church Office if you will join us. The deadline is January 11.

Sometimes Christians, Jews and Muslims are referred to as People of the Book. Jews have the Old (First) Testament, Muslims the Koran, and Christians our Bible. As Martin Luther said, "God's word is our great heritage". I feel that our understanding of God's Word can be enriched through our association with other people of faith. What do you think?

### **Church Council Highlights from December:**

- Income for the month of October was \$15,842.45.
- WELCA paid a mortgage payment
- Total Expenses for October were \$21,026.66, leaving a deficit of \$5,184.21. Balance in checking account—\$28,661.43.
- Total income for November was \$13,571.88.
- Expenses for November—\$14,970.29, leaving a deficit for November of \$1,398.41. Balance in checking account—\$27,263.02.
- Pastor Laura reported there were a total of 15 people that increased their giving on the 2019 Commitment cards and a .35% increase in giving overall.
- Endowment Scholarships were handed out to four youth members in November.
- Due to health issues, Nancy Lindenmuth has resigned from council. Her term expires in February 2021. According to the church constitution if a council member's place becomes vacant, the council shall elect by majority vote a successor until the next annual meeting. All agreed that Lowell Martin should be asked to fill the vacancy.



### The Recipe Swap

### **Hermit Cookies:**

2 cups raisins 1/4 tsp allspice

1 cup water 3 eggs 1 tsp banking soda 1 tsp v

1 tsp banking soda 1 tsp vanilla 1 cup shortening 4 cups flour

2 cups sugar 1 tsp baking powder

1 1/2 tsp cinnamon 1 tsp salt

1/4 tsp nutmeg



Boil raisins in water, drain and save 1/s cup liquid. Cool raisins; add soda to them. Combine shortening, sugar and spices. Add eggs one at a time, beating after each addition. Add vanilla and reserved liquid. Stir in flour, baking powder and salt. Add raisins. Chill. Drop by tablespoonfulls on greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 for 12—15 minutes. Don't allow to brown or will be crisp. To store, place wax paper between layers.

### **Reading resolutions**

Every January, many Christians resolve to read the entire Bible in one year. That's a worthy goal, but God doesn't require us to read a certain number of verses or chapters per day. Instead, he tells us to simply be in his Word — and thus be with him — so he can grow our faith, light our path and assure us of his love and forgiveness. God's Word is a precious gift, but we need to "unwrap" it!

F.B. Meyer offers this helpful advice for a new year of discovering (and rediscovering!) Scripture: "Read the Bible, not as a newspaper, but as a home letter. If a cluster of heavenly fruit hangs within reach, gather it. If a promise lies upon the page as a blank check, cash it. If a prayer is recorded, appropriate it and launch it as a feathered arrow from the bow of your desire. If an example of holiness gleams before you, ask God to do as much for you. If the truth is revealed ... entreat that its brilliance may ever irradiate ... your life."

### Kingfisher faith

In a video on his publisher's website, Eugene Peterson tells of watching a kingfisher repeatedly dive for fish in a lake. Peterson counted 37 dives before the kingfisher caught its supper! "And he's the king fisher!" Peterson chuckles. From that bird-watching episode, he gleaned a ministry lesson: It may take a long time and many attempts — maybe dozens! — before something works out.



God calls us to live out his love faithfully, even when we don't seem to be accomplishing anything. Maybe we extend 36 invitations to worship, work 36 monthly shifts at a food bank or utter 36 prayers without seeing results. "What's the point?" we wonder. But the kingfisher urges us on: "Maybe number 37 is the charm!"

In the words of St. Paul (and mixing fishing and farming metaphors): "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up" (Galatians 6:9, NIV).

### Lessons in wise faith

"The Magi teach us true faith," said Martin Luther. Given the obstacles they encountered, we would understand if they had given up altogether!

First, the travelers were "off the mark," coming to Jerusalem to seek a newborn king in a "royal palace." Then, directed to Bethlehem, the wise men found a sight "so utterly out of keeping with a king" — a poor young woman and child, in a "poor hut" — that one might expect them to head straight home. "But," declares Luther, "with a great, strong and full faith they ... follow the word of the prophet and the witness of the star in all purity of heart," bowing to worship and honor the Savior.
