



Message from Designated Pastor Mindy...



Since Mother Nature scrambled our plans for Ash Wednesday Worship, here's a reprise of what I would have told you there. Reboot Lent!

But first a few words about those post snow-storm days.

I came to church the morning after the snow stopped. I got in fine, but the phone didn't work (neither did my cell phone, for reasons unconnected to the storm). I flipped the light switch, and a different light dawned. So, I walked down to Allen Johnson's where I heard the thump of a generator and learned that PP&L was already out, reporting no return of power till Thursday.

I let it be known as I could (another story) that I would be here for worship on Wednesday, that we would improvise according to conditions and that whoever came, came.

Ash Wednesday at dusk found me in the parking lot. The keypad failed that day so I couldn't get the ashes.

As the time of worship approached, I turned on my driver's car lights and pointed them at the road. As cars approached, I'd hop out and wave. Maybe I was a little too far back. Some cars slowed and went past. A fair few pulled in and turned around (I prayed for all of them). A grand total of 2 cars and 4 people pulled up for a snipped of Scripture and a prayer. It was lovely, I hope it's a little different next year.

Now to the message.

I don't usually go for laughs on Ash Wednesday(!) But sometimes something offers such a real and unexpected perspective that laughter is really the only possible response. So, in the tide of clergy attempts to connect Valentine's Day to Ash Wednesday (they ranged from terrible to blasphemous) someone posted a meme:

Smarmy guy to pretty woman: "So what are you doing on Valentine's Day?"

Pretty woman: "Rubbing dirt onto people's faces and telling them they're going to die."

The church and the world are different places.

The world does everything it can to evade the very idea of death.

The church puts the awareness of death in, and literally, on our faces.

And it is a powerful thing. I remember my emotions as young pastor the first time I told the cute baby I'd baptized the week before, the dear elder saints whose funerals I was pretty sure I'd conduct before the year was out, my father - "Remember that you are dust and to dust you will return." It still rocks me.

But we can say that -boldly with full awareness of what death is, because we know that death is more than just death. We know through the witness of Jesus Christ that although dust we are, we are beloved dust, ensouled and used by the creator to make even more vibrant and compelling declarations of God's love for us. Death after Jesus' resurrection is still death, but not the end.

And so Lent gives us the opportunity - the necessity! - of being brutally honest about what we are and what God is and the acting into new ways of showing God's love and goodness.

I tend to alternate these three Ash Wednesday blessings: "Remember that you are dust and to dust you will return," "Repent and believe the Gospel," and "You are beloved dust." Sit with each of them for a while.







Lent is a season when we take a look at our lives in view of God's mercy toward us in the sacrifice of his Son for us on the cross. We, in turn, are called by God, especially during this time of repentance and reflection, to be living sacrifices for him, displaying our devotion to him in word and deed. Jesus helps us to see the richness of God's mercy in his life, death and resurrection. Join us each Wednesday in Lent

for our worship services using Holden Evening Prayer and as we explore the Lenten series "In View of God's Mercy" by theology professor David Peter. We will focus our eyes of faith on the meaning behind God's mercy made manifest in Christ.

Pastor Mindy's Media Moment

Books - Take and Read by Eugene Price. Not a recent book, but in this case, that doesn't much matter. It's a collection of extremely short reviews of particularly good spiritual books. Categories include Poets, Worship and Liturgy, Sin and the Devil, Place, and Jesus, among others. I'll leave it on my desk 'til Easter. If you're looking for a good read, you'll find one here. Let me know about it.

Music - Jesus Christ Superstar. Ok, I'm showing my age, but I cannot do Good Friday without this. I first heard the London Stage recording in the home of conservative Irish Catholic friends of my parents who got it immediately. I was dumbfounded. I still am. Find a place alone and listen straight through.

Pressed

Gethsemane, the name of the place where Jesus prayed before his betrayal, is an Aramaic word for "olive press." During Bible times, olives were pressed three times to remove all the valuable oil. Before being arrested in the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus felt the full pressing weight of our sins on his shoulders. Surrounded by olive trees, praying fervently while sweating drops of blood, the perfect Son of God asked his heavenly Father three times to remove the cup of suffering.

Instead of removing that trial, God used it to redeem and save humankind. Likewise, God uses our hardships to refine and strengthen our faith.

In The Rock, the Road and the Rabbi, TV host Kathie Lee Gifford and Messianic Rabbi Jason Sobel speculate that if Peter, along with James and John, hadn't fallen asleep in Gethsemane, he may have had the strength to not deny Jesus later that night.

"All of us must be vigilant to watch and pray so that we don't succumb to the temptation to deny the Lord when we go through the olive presses of life and feel like we are being crushed by our situation and circumstances," the authors write. "We must remember that it is the crushing that brings out the true inner value and worth of the olive."
