

#### **Pastor Kim's Message**

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Imagine a classroom full of elementary age children all singing as loud as they could:

If you're happy and you know it clap your hands
If you're happy and you know it clap your hands
If you're happy and you know it then your face should
surely show it
If you're happy and you know it clap your hands

A classroom full of children, all singing – yelling – and clapping, stomping, shouting, and laughing together... if they weren't happy when the song began, they were happy by the end.

It is one of those simple childhood songs that we all learned (and occasionally still sing;)) that without our ever really thinking about it, taught us a fantastic lesson about life:

our behaviors show what we feel and believe.

Red eyes show sadness. Broad laughing smile shows happiness. Slumped shoulders and head show depression. Open hands show welcome. We know and do these things without thinking, and even though we don't think about it for ourselves, others read those behaviors in us and react to them, in how *they* feel, in how *they* act, and even in what *they* believe. We have – by the simple reflection of our beliefs – the power to change people's beliefs. Talk about moving mountains! But power is useless when it is not used to create strength, and true strength is found in relationship with Jesus Christ.

As Christians we must ask ourselves: what about us shows that we believe in Jesus Christ, and having the gift of His forgiveness will live eternally in the joy of heaven? If we are filled with God's Holy Spirit, do our actions match the fruit of the Spirit, listed in Galatians as love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control? When I was still quite young someone said to me: "Watch how you live, because your life is the only Bible some people will ever read". Friends, what are people reading in you?

Next month, we as a congregation will begin the program "Committed to Christ". It is a program designed to help us be what we believe. "Committed to Christ" helps us look at our beliefs and our actions so that they can match, so that we have a greater understanding of what it is we believe, so that we know what we individually are able to do.

Imagine a congregation full of God's children all singing as loud as they can:

If you're saved and you know it shout "AMEN!"
If you're saved and you know it shout "AMEN!"
If you have Jesus as your Saviour then your life should show His favor
If you're saved and you know it shout "AMEN!"

A congregation full of God's children, all singing – living – and serving, sharing, witnessing, and loving together... if they weren't happy when the song began, they were happy by the end.

Now, let's not imagine it. Let's be it! And let the people say: AMEN!



#### The **Truth** About **Inhalants**

Slang-Glue, Kick, Bang, Sniff, Huff, Poppers, Whippets, Texas Shoeshine

#### Get the Facts...

Inhalants affect your brain. Inhalants are substances or fumes from products such as glue or paint thinner that are sniffed or "huffed" to cause an immediate high. Because they affect your brain with much greater speed and force than many other substances, they can cause irreversible physical and mental damage before you know what's happened.

Inhalants affect your heart. Inhalants starve the body of oxygen and force the heart to beat irregularly and more rapidly—that can be dangerous for your

Inhalants damage other parts of your body.
People who use inhalants can experience nausea and nosebleeds; develop liver, lung, and kidney problems; and lose their sense of hearing or smell. Chronic use can lead to muscle wasting and reduced muscle tone

Inhalants can cause sudden death. Inhalants can kill you instantly. Inhalant users can die by suffocation, choking on their vomit, or having a heart attack.

Before You Risk It... Get the facts. Inhalants can kill you the very first time you use them.

**Stay informed.** Inhalants include a large group of chemicals that are found in such household products as aerosol sprays, cleaning fluids, glue, paint, paint thinner, gasoline, propane, nail polish remover, correction fluid, and marker pens. None of these are safe to inhale—they all can kill you.

Be aware. Chemicals like amyl nitrite and isobutyl nitrite ("poppers") and nitrous oxide ("whippets") are often sold at concerts and dance clubs. They can permanently damage your body and brain.

**Know the risks.** Chronic inhalant abusers may permanently lose the ability to perform everyday functions like walking, talking, and thinking.

Look around you. The vast majority of teens aren't using inhalants. According to a 2006 study, only 1.3 percent of teens are regular inhalant users and 9 in 10 teens have never even tried inhalants.

#### Know the Signs...

How can you tell if a friend is using inhalants? Sometimes it's tough to tell. But there are signs you can look for. If your friend has one or more of the following warning signs, he or she may be using

- Slurred speech
- Drunk, dizzy, or dazed appearanceUnusual breath odor
- · Chemical smell on clothing
- Paint stains on body or faceRed eyes
- Runny nose

What can you do to help someone who is using inhalants? Be a real friend. Encourage your friend to seek professional help. For information and referrals, call SAMHSA's Health Information Network at 1-877-SAMHSA-7 (1-877-726-4727).


# It's time for Our Annual Church Picnic!!!!

#### We will be collecting items to make "Flood Buckets"

We did it before, but our neighbors' need calls us again!

Families involved in the recent flooding are in need of assistance. With the right materials, many of them can continue the overwhelming job of cleaning up after a disaster or flood on their own or with the help of volunteers.

#### Here is what is needed to prepare a Clean-up Bucket / Flood Bucket:

One five-gallon bucket with re-sealable lid

Bleach (two 1-quart or one 82 oz. bottle)

Five scouring pads

Seven sponges, assorted sizes

One scrub brush

Eighteen cleaning towels (reusable, like Easy Wipes®)

One 50-78 oz. box dry laundry detergent

One 12 oz. bottle of liquid concentrated household cleaner

(like Lysol®)

One 25 oz. bottle liquid disinfectant dish soap (like Dawn®)

One package of 48-50 clothespins

Clothesline, two 50 ft. or one 100 ft.

Five dust masks

Two pairs latex gloves (like Playtex®)

One pair work gloves

28-bag roll of heavy-duty trash bags (30-45 gallon)

One 6-9 oz. bottle of insect repellent

(pump, drops or lotion, not aerosol)



- Do not think that you have to provide *all* of the items. Any contribution is welcome.
- Please provide all liquids in new, unopened <u>plastic</u> bottles.
- Be sure to provide only new materials.
- If the requested item size is not available, go down to the next available size.


