



CATHEDRAL FLOOR PLAN —

Traditionally, a cathedral is laid out in the shape of a cross. The lower section or nave (from Latin for ship), along with the transepts (the arms of the cross), is where the congregation sits. The choir sits on either side of the chancel. Despite our common terminology, the sanctuary (from Latin for holy) isn't the full worship space but the area right before the altar. The location of the lectern, from which Scripture is read, and pulpit, used for preaching, may vary.

Take nice sip of coffee—real or metaphorical sit back, and imagine Christ's United 10 years from now.

I'm going to guess that many of us first

envisioned things pretty much as they are now: worship following a pattern similar to what it has been (perhaps with enhanced technology), groups still carrying on the servant work of the church (and I cannot tell you often enough how impressed I am with what you do for God's hurting world), pretty much the same group of people.

And of course, we know that's unlikely. OK, ten years maybe, but 15 or 20? Improbable. We are not a young crowd, and we are unlikely to manage a Sarah and Abraham trick and repopulate the church with babies. Even if we do, we're not doing a banner job of keeping them involved. That is, of course, not a unique situation. I am impressed with how faithful acolytes are at showing up when assigned, and I wonder whether more responsibility might make them likelier to attend when they're not serving?

Granted that we are unlikely to discover a mother lode of similar people (although you did that brilliantly and bravely when you merged) how can this congregation begin to think about being Church—with our Lutheran integrity intact—for others? Who might they be? what might tit look like?

I'm proposing g a task force to consider these issues. I have no agenda here, I'm just proposing prayerful thought discussion, research, and willingness to try to hear what the Spirit might be whispering. Interested? Let me know.



Redeeming 'wasted' time

In Just Like Jesus, Max Lucado writes that the average American spends a total of six months waiting at stoplights, eight months opening junk mail, 18 months looking for items we've lost and five years standing in line. All the while, many of us grumble: "What a waste of time! I could be doing something much more important! Where are my keys?"

But Lucado suggests that we give these moments to God. Rather than whispering to ourselves, we can speak to God in prayer. "Simple phrases such as 'Thank you, Father,' 'Be sovereign in this hour, O Lord,' 'You are my resting place, Jesus' can turn a commute into a pilgrimage," he writes. "You needn't leave your office or kneel in your kitchen. Just pray where you are. Let the kitchen become a cathedral or the classroom a chapel. Give God your whispering thoughts."

When we do this, "the common becomes uncommon," Lucado adds. What's more, "wasted" time becomes valuable; boring waits become meditative; the lost — your time, if not also your keys — is redeemed.



Northeastern PA Synod 37th Assembly was held on Saturday, June 8th at Atonement Lutheran, Wyomissing.

I (Donna Wallace) "attended via Zoom as CULC delegate and voted by iPhone connection. The assembly sessions were recorded and are able to be viewed by all interested on **nepasynod.org/assembly2024/.** A report of some of the assembly highlights was provided to Council. A few are listed below.

1) Resolution to reaffirm Synod's commitment to welcoming and loving the whole body of Christ.... we encourage and invite all people of all sexual orientations, gender identities and expressions, races and ethnicities, ages, socioeconomic statuses, abilities, citizenship and migration statuses to participate fully in the life and work of the church. (YES - 266 NO - 38)

2) Mission District Assembly Dean shall be selected from ministers, under call or retired whose congregational membership is in the Mission District. (YES - 266 NO - 32)

3) A Licensed Lay Minister (LLM) who is serving as a pastoral presence on a congregation shall have voice and vote at Synod assembly. (YES - 271 NO - 19)

The 6261 Ministry Community pilot group was introduced and spoke about how it is being set up to serve six Reading congregations (6261 stands for 6 congregations working together with 2 ordained pastors, 6 lay ministers, and 1 deacon).

Prepared for a purpose

Timothy Dalrymple, president and CEO of *Christianity Today*, was a successful Stanford gymnast with Olympic dreams. But he broke his neck before the 1996 Olympic Trials and never reached his sport's "promised land." Although the injury led to chronic pain, Dalrymple doesn't regret his pursuit or even the fall.

Even while hospitalized, he experienced "a profound assurance" of God's loving presence. "If I could know the peace of God even when my health and hopes were stripped away from me, then what did I have to fear?" he writes. "It was a liberating revelation. Since God is with us even in the valley of the shadow of death, we need fear no evil, for no evil can take God away."

In the long run, so-called failure can matter more than victory, Dalrymple learned. "The purpose of my gymnastics career was never to purchase a few shining moments of gold-medal glory but to prepare me for the rest of my life. It was never about making me a champion. It was about [shaping me into the image of Christ and] making me an instrument [for the glory of Christ and for the good of the world]."
